


Utility poles often fade into the background. They are a ubiquitous part of our modern landscape, tethering the wires that bring us the services that turn the lights on and keep us connected. The "utility" in utility pole primarily references its role in facilitating services like electricity and communications. What might be their other utilities?

Once I started noticing them, I couldn't stop. In ridealongs with lineworkers down in the bayou and daily walks around New Orleans, I learned how seeing them is a way of seeing how infrastructures become embedded in environments. These poles can tell us about the places we live and how we live in those places. In southeast Louisiana, this is a place shaped by multiple relations to water - from the ever changing rivers, bayous, and the coastline, to increasing storms, floods, and land loss. These poles bring service to residents at the tip of the coast and to oil and gas facilities that line the river. Utility poles are part of this broader array of infrastructures that makes this region both habitable and vulnerable.

Imagining futures in coastal Louisiana requires disentangling and re-imagining our relations to infrastructures. Where will the utilty pole be in these futures?












